Hispanic Heritage Contest Awards Dinner

On Monday, October 18, 2010 NCC's first Hispanic Heritage Contest Awards Dinner was held in the Culinary Arts Dining Room. Many contestants attended the dinner, which included presentations of student entries. Entries included visual displays on poster board, poems, and stories of personal experience. The contest stipulated that students use their creative abilities to represent Latino culture. Participants were asked to tell a panel of judges, in either literary or visual art works, what Latin American culture means to them, what it means for the United States, and what their experience has been with people of Hispanic descent. Students of all heritages were invited to participate in the event.

The judges chose a work by Jessica Alvia, who made a poster detailing many aspects of the culture of Ecuador, as the winning entry.

At the beginning of the dinner, Barbara Drotman, Dean of College Advancement, spoke about NCC's long history of diversity, cultural awareness and inclusion, "Diversity comes naturally to the college," she said. She described the many workshops, panels, committees and events that focus on diversity at the college.

Director of Student Services Andres Gomez introduced the student presentations by emphasizing that all the contestants are winners. Winning contestants will recieve tickets and transportation to a performance at El Repertorio Español, a theater in New York City that presents plays in Spanish of interest to the Hispanic/Latino community and highlights its cultural heritage.

NCC Foundation Board member Valerie Cooper arranged for corporate sponsors to act as judges for the contest. A wonderful dinner was prepared and served for the event by students in the Principles of Food (HSP 101) class.

UN Day and Congo Week Observed

On October 20, Norwalk Community College observed United Nations Day with a panel discussion on "Conflict Minerals: The Deadly Scramble for Natural Resources in Africa and How We Can Help."

The panelists included Hannah Taylor, a member of the U.N. Congo Peacekeeping Mission; Meryl Zendarksi, an expert on the Democratic Republic of Congo and former consultant for Africa Action; and Jason Stearns, a doctoral student at Yale University and former coordinator of the U.N. Group of Experts on the Congo.

The panelists discussed how illegal mining of minerals in the Democratic Republic of Congo continues to fuel the most devastating war since World War II - a war that has already claimed six million lives. Panelists also discussed ongoing efforts to ensure that mining resources needed by industrial societies does not exacerbate conflict and human suffering.

October 20 was also observed as "Cell Out Day," when a worldwide boycott of cell phones from noon to 1 p.m. called attention to the role coltan, a mineral used in the manufacture of cell phones, has played in furthering the Congo War.

Congo Week was started in October 2008 when students and community activists from around the world organized events in their communities focusing on the crisis in Congo. The event was called "Break the Silence" Congo Week.

United Nations Day (UN Day) is observed annually worldwide on October 24 to commemorate the founding of the United Nations in October 1945.
